Robert L. Hill is a retired Corporate and Securities Law Attorney. He received his Juris Doctor Degree from the Ohio State University Law School. He was employed in senior legal positions by a number of major corporations including The Nationwide Insurance Companies, Waddell & Reed, Inc. and Aetna Life Insurance Company. He also served as Executive Director of the International Association of Defense Counsel Pre-suit Mediation Program and the National Law Firm Mediation Network. A retired Colonel, he spent the last seven years of his military career in the Army Office of Legislative Liaison in the Pentagon where he attended and reported on a number of significant Congressional hearings. He has received numerous awards for his work for the community, for military service and for the Legal Profession and served in leadership positions on a number of local Non-Profit Corporation Boards. 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KEYNOTE



GENERAL GEORGE W.
CASEY, JR.
(U.S. ARMY, RETIRED)

General George Casey enjoyed a 41-year career in the US Army following his graduation from Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service in 1970. He is an accomplished soldier and an authority on strategic leadership.

As the Army Chief of Staff from 2007-2011, he led one of our largest and most complex organizations during one of the most extraordinary periods in our history. He is widely credited with restoring balance to a war-weary Army and leading the transformation to keep it relevant in the 21st Century. Prior to this, from July 2004 to February 2007, he commanded the Multi-National Force – Iraq, a coalition of more than 30 countries where he guided the mission through its toughest days.

Currently, he lectures internationally on leadership to the leaders of national and multinational corporations, at the Johnson School of Management, Cornell University, and at other business schools. He also teaches international relations at the Korbel School. He is the Chairman of the Board of the USO, and serves on the board of Georgetown University and on numerous boards of organizations that support our servicemen and women, our veterans and their families.

He holds a Master's Degree in International Relations from Denver University, and served as a Senior Fellow at the Atlantic Council of the United States. He has published a book, *Strategic Reflections, Operation Iraqi Freedom, July 2004-2007* (October 2012), about his experiences in Iraq, and several articles on leadership, including: "Leading in a VUCA World", *Fortune Magazine* (March 20, 2014).

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**MAJOR GENERAL
MICHAEL D. JONES,
U.S. ARMY (RET.)**

General Jones served in a wide variety of command and staff positions in Armor units, including tours for Operation Joint Endeavor in Bosnia and in Iraq twice as part of Operation Iraqi Freedom. From 2004-2005, he was Assistant Division Commander for the 1st Cavalry Division, where he was responsible for combat operations in Baghdad and forming and training Iraqi security forces, and again in 2007-2008 as Commander, Civilian Police Assistance Training Team, responsible for developing the Ministry of Interior and Iraqi police and border forces.

As a general officer, in addition to his tours in Iraq, General Jones served as the Deputy Director, Strategic Plans and Policy for the Joint Staff in the Pentagon, where he was responsible for military planning and strategy for the Middle East. He also served as the Director of Operations for United States Central Command, responsible for U.S. military operations in the Middle East and Southwest Asia, from 2008-2010. As a senior officer, General Jones was extensively involved in cyber operations at both the tactical and strategic level.

His last active duty assignment was as the Chief of Staff, United States Central Command. General Jones has been an independent management consultant, as well as a Member of The SPECTRUM Group in Alexandria, Virginia. At SPECTRUM, he has assisted a variety of corporate clients, principally in the Federal and Defense market. He also continues to stay engaged in policy issues related to security in the Middle East.



**MAJOR GENERAL
JAMES LARIVIERE
USMC (RET.)**

General Lariviere has over 20 years of senior civilian and military experience in national security affairs. As a Major General in the Marine Corps Reserve, his active and Reserve service as a combat arms officer includes command at every level, serving in over 30 countries and participating in contingency operations in Lebanon and Afghanistan. His last active duty assignment was as Deputy Director Politico-Military Affairs (Africa), J5 Strategic Plans and Policy, The Joint Staff.

Jim has over a decade of experience on Capitol Hill. He served as military legislative assistant to the Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Military Personnel, and later as a professional staff member on the Defense Policy Staff of the House Armed Services Committee. There, his portfolio included legislative and policy oversight of on-going contingency operations, the Joint Staff, Combatant Commands, OSD (Policy) and issues relating to foreign nations.

Jim is currently the Vice President for Health Net Federal Services. He previously worked as a senior public policy advisor assisting companies develop legislative and marketing strategies in the defense, homeland security and veteran's affairs sectors. He is the former President of the International Stability Operations Association.

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KEVIN BROWN
"RED EAGLE"
Chairman of the
Mohegan Tribe

Kevin Brown "Red Eagle" was elected Chairman of the Mohegan Tribe in October 2013. As Chairman, Brown is responsible for maintaining the sovereignty that the Mohegan Tribe fought hundreds of years for, overseeing its numerous business entities and ensuring the well-being of its more than 2,100 Tribal citizens. As Chairman, Brown also serves as Chairman of the Mohegan Tribal Gaming Authority (MTGA). Under his leadership, the Mohegan Tribe has made monumental steps forward in its business growth and expanded its footprint worldwide including the future Inspire Integrated Resort in South Korea. A native of Montville, Connecticut, Brown proudly served in the United States Army for 25 years. He retired as a Colonel, deployed 5 times to over 5 countries and served in 3 conflicts. Brown is a Doctoral Candidate in Security Studies from Kansas State University, and also earned a Master of Arts in Public Diplomacy from Norwich University, a Master of Science in Operations Research from the Naval Postgraduate School, and a Bachelor of Science in Aerospace Engineering from the United States Military Academy at West Point.



PAUL BUCHA
Medal of Honor Recipient

Paul Bucha is a graduate of West Point and Stanford University. After graduating Stanford, he served as a company commander in Vietnam and for his distinguished service received the Congressional Medal of Honor. From 1973 to 1979 Paul Bucha was stationed in Tehran, Iran, as Executive Senior VP for International Operations for Electronic Data Systems headquartered in Tehran. Paul Bucha was also senior executive for the EDS operations in Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Pakistan, Turkey, Europe and Asia. In addition to his corporate activities and leadership in organizations from The Fisher House Foundation and Intrepid Fallen Heroes Fund to the Department of Labor's Advisory Committee on Veterans Education and Training and Employer Outreach, Paul Bucha is a frequent lecturer to numerous colleges, corporations, political leaders and military leaders of all branches on honor and leadership.



DR. DAVID A. COOPER
Chair of the Department of
National Security Affairs,
U.S. Naval War College

Dr. David A. Cooper has served since 2010 as the Chair of the Department of National Security Affairs at the U.S. Naval War College and before that as a Senior Research Fellow at the Center for the Study of Weapons of Mass Destruction at the National Defense University. He is an expert on nonproliferation, disarmament, weapons of mass destruction, and multilateral negotiations and organizations. He served in the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD), in a variety of positions including as the Principal Director for Homeland Security Integration. He was the Director of the Office of Nonproliferation Policy, overseeing efforts to prevent the spread of weapons of mass destruction and their missile delivery systems. He also led the U.S. Delegation to the Proliferation Security Initiative (PSI) Operational Experts Group and served as the U.S. Representative to the Second United Nations Panel of Governmental Experts on Missiles. Previously he was the Deputy Director and then Director of the Office of Strategic Arms Control Policy. He holds a Ph.D. in Political Science and International Relations from The Australian National University, a Master's of International Affairs from Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs, and is a graduate of Oberlin College.

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ARTHUR HOUSE
Chief Cybersecurity Risk
Officer, State of Connecticut

Arthur House became Chief Cybersecurity Risk Officer for the State of Connecticut in October 2016 after four years as Chairman of Connecticut's Public Utilities Regulatory Authority. House has a background in national security, having served as Director of Communications in the Office of the Director of National Intelligence and as Chief of the Communications Group for the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency, a combat support agency of the U.S. Department of Defense. As a White House Fellow he served as Special Projects Officer on the staff of the National Security Council. In the private sector, House was Senior Vice President of Public Affairs at Webster Bank and also held senior executive positions at Cigna, Aetna, and Tenneco. House is a graduate of Tufts College and has a Ph.D degree from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University. He has published a book and several articles on international relations subjects and taught graduate courses at the Fletcher School, the University of Connecticut, and Georgetown University.



LTC ROY KAMPHAUSEN

Senior VP for Research and
Director of the Washington,
D.C., office, The National
Bureau of Asian Research

Roy D. Kamphausen is Senior Vice President for Research and Director of the Washington, D.C., office at The National Bureau of Asian Research (NBR). He provides executive leadership to NBR's policy research agenda on security, politics, energy, economics, and trade. Mr. Kamphausen directs NBR's engagement with the administration, U.S. Congress, and foreign embassies in Washington, D.C.. Mr. Kamphausen is an adjunct associate professor at Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs and a senior adviser on East Asia for the University of Connecticut's Office of Global Affairs. He lectures regularly at leading U.S. military institutions, including the United States Military Academy (West Point) and the U.S. Army War College. He regularly briefs members of Congress and consults for the U.S. Department of Defense. Prior to joining NBR, Mr. Kamphausen served as a career U.S. Army officer. As a China foreign area officer, his career included assignments as China policy director in the Office of the Secretary of Defense, China strategist for the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and a military attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Beijing.



ELLEN LAIPSON

Ellen Laipson is the Director of the International Security program at the Schar School of Government and Public Policy at George Mason University. She joins GMU after a distinguished 25 year career in government and as President and CEO of the Stimson Center (2002-2015). Her last post in government was Vice Chair of the National Intelligence Council (1997-2002). She also served on the State Department's policy planning staff, the National Security Council staff, and the Congressional Research Service. A member of the Council on Foreign Relations, she serves on the Advisory Councils of the International Institute of Strategic Studies, the Chicago Council on Global Affairs, and Georgetown University's Institute for the Study of Diplomacy. She served on the board of the Asia Foundation (2003-2015). She was a member of the CIA External Advisory Panel from 2006-2009, President Obama's Intelligence Advisory Board from 2009-2013, and on the Secretary of State's Foreign Affairs Policy Board 2011-2014. Laipson has an M.A. from the School of Advanced International Studies, Johns Hopkins University and an AB from Cornell University.

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DR. JIM WALSH
Senior Research Associate,
Massachusetts Institute of
Technology (MIT)

Dr. Jim Walsh is a Senior Research Associate at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Security Studies Program (SSP). Dr. Walsh's research and writings focus on international security, and in particular, topics involving nuclear weapons, the Middle East, and East Asia. Dr. Walsh has testified before the United States Senate and House of Representatives on issues of nuclear terrorism, Iran, and North Korea. He is one of a handful of Americans who has traveled to both Iran and North Korea for talks with officials about nuclear issues. His recent publications include "Stopping North Korea, Inc.: Sanctions Effectiveness and Unintended Consequences" and "Rivals, Adversaries, and Partners: Iran and Iraq in the Middle East" in *Iran and Its Neighbors*. He is the international security contributor to the NPR program "Here and Now," and his comments and analysis have appeared in numerous national and international media outlets. Before coming to MIT, Dr. Walsh was Executive Director of the Managing the Atom project at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government. He has taught at both Harvard University and MIT. Dr. Walsh received his Ph.D from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Mike Zacchea was commissioned a 2nd lieutenant in the Marine Corps in 1990. Among his many positions, he served at Camp Lejeune, deployed to Somalia for OPERATION RESTORE HOPE and to Haiti for OPERATION SUPPORT DEMOCRACY. In March 2004, as a major, he deployed to Iraq for OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM II. In addition to Mike's numerous military awards, he was the first and, at the time, only American recognized by the Iraqi government by the Order of the Lion of Babylon. Mike helped form a non-profit of military advisers to help Iraqi interpreters immigrate to the United States, nationally known as Netroots: the List Project. In 2009, he founded the the UConn Entrepreneur Bootcamp for Veterans with Disabilities. He served on a multi-agency cross-disciplinary working group chaired by the CT Dept of Veterans Affairs focusing on veteran reintegration, education, training, and workforce re-entry issues, and presently serves on the Benefit corporations state task force. Mike founded the CT Veterans Chamber of Commerce. Mike is a frequent guest speaker in the media, and has been featured in several books and documentaries addressing the Iraq War and veterans issues. Mike is the author of several books, including *The Ragged Edge: A US Marine's Account of Leading the Iraqi Army Fifth Battalion*.
